



WALKING

Walk 4 - Old Oaks, Paradise Ln, Stone Down, Ashwell, Gypsy, Deer

2.9 mile walk crossing fields, tracks and tarmac lanes

- Using the footpath between The Walnut Terraces and The Birches, walk to the top.
- Through the kissing gate and turn left. In a few metres take the stile on your right.
- Head straight up the field (sometimes cattle graze here). Quite steep, but great views.
- At the top of this field cross the stile. At the time of mapping this walk the stile is in disrepair so please take care.
- Follow the track up this field. At the brow, head diagonally to top right hand corner. Can be extremely muddy here - wellies recommended unless we've had a long stretch of dry weather.
- Follow this very pleasant track (views of Paddington Farm Trust on your left) until you reach a junction (approx. 3/4 mile).
- Turn left. Continue for approx 0.2miles. Turn left. The Tor will be on your right.
- In approx. 200m, use the kissing gate, head up the concrete path and pass through kissing gate at the end.
- Instead of following the path up the Tor, turn left onto the grass track. Head down to the lowest track which will take you on a lovely wooded walk around the side of the Tor.
- In approx. 1/4 mile you will emerge from the woods and see a gate and stile on your left. Pass through here. Walk down a steep track and emerge on Ashwell Lane.
- Turn left. Continue straight on this road, past Basketfield Lane on your left and merge into Gypsy Lane.
- In approx. 50m, look out for the alpacas (long haired mammals like llamas) on your left. Lovely views of the Somerset Levels on your right.
- Continue on Gypsy Lane, past Glastonbury Spring Water on your left. In approx. 400m take stile on your left.
- Follow the track across 6 to 7 fields heading in a straight(ish) line. Emerge in Stone Down Lane.
- Cross Stone Down, through kissing gate.
- Continue for approx. 250m. Kissing gate on right leads back to The Old Oaks.

Dog friendly but may encounter cattle & sheep

Not suitable for wheelchairs

Very muddy in places during winter

Steep climb up the first 2 fields
